1. Aim of the Programme

The Masters in Eduction is a two year (of four semesters) professional post graduate programme for advanced praxis based study of the discipline of Education.

The M.Ed Degree Programme is designed to develop the discipline of Teacher Education for empowering teacher educands with

- in-depth knowledge and understanding of Education.
- specialisations in select areas of Education. as well as
- capapabilities for Research in Education.

The Programme is embedded in comprehensive foundations of Philosophy, Sociology, Psychology, Research Methodology, and other

specialised areas of Education. Besides academic study, the Programme intends to sensitise students towards critical issues in Education and to evolve as protective practitioners in text book preparation, curriculum reform, educational policy analysis, educational administration, educational technology, educational evaluation, special education, inclusive education, Non Formal education, human rights education, guidance and counselling, and the like, in harmony, with national aspirations and global trends. It seeks to prepare educational experts capable of generating knowledge and to find solutions to the problems and issues relating to the theory and practice in the varied fields of education.

The Programme also has a strong research component with a view to hone the research acumen and potential of the students in diverse dimensions of Education as well as to groom them for doctoral and post-doctoral research in Education.

The Expert Committees in Education (PG) pooled the best expertise available to revise the MEd. curriculum for strengthening the content structure, as well as its assessment of the Programme so us to be at par with the professional requirement of the programme.

2. Scope of the Programme

The scope of the Post Graduate Teacher Education programme spells out its strategic benefits and deliverables. The Two Year M.Ed Degree Programme is designed to mould teacher educands as per with global standards. After successful completion of the M.Ed Programme, it is expected that teacher educands will

* have crystal clear knowledge about the pedagogical sciences

- attain sound foundations of the multi-dimensional bases of teacher education
- be equipped with innovative talents in the art and science of teaching
- acquire specific skills related to lifelong learning, teaching and research
- be fortified with abilities to transact soft skills and life skills in professional life
- be conversant with up-to-date information in the discipline of education
- harness ICT and technological developments for educational practice, professional empowerment and constructive life
- be groomed as professionals in teacher education, as specialised personnel / leaders in different walks of life, and as social engineers
- be inspired to broaden their horizons and nurture social responsibility

3. Admission

The admission, eligiblity for admission, norms for admission, and reservation of seats for the Two Year M.Ed. Degree Programme shall be in accordance with University/Government/NCTE norms from time to time.

4. Medium of Instruction and Assessment

The medium of instruction and assessment (Internal and External) of the M.Ed. Degree Programme shall be English.

Those candidates who desire to prepare tools for data collection in Malayalam, Hindi, Sanskrit or Arabic languages, are permitted to do so, but the English version of the same shall also be appended in the Dissertation.

5. Faculty under which the Degree is awarded

The Degree for the Two Year M.Ed. Programmes will be awarded under the Faculty of Education.

6. Note on compliance with the UGC Minimum Standards for the conduct and award of Post Graduate Degree

In compliance with the UGC's Act, the M.Ed. Degree offered by the Mahatma Gandhi University shall observe the minimum standards of instruction and norms prescribed by the National Council for Teacher Education (NCTE). The Two Year M.Ed Programme shall be imparted by duly qualified teaching faculty and shall have appropriate acedemic physical infrastructure facilities.

7. The Programme Structure

In tune with the framework suggested by NCTE, the M.Ed. Programme comprises theory courses (including common core courses and branches of specialization courses), field internships, research leading to dissertation, and viva voce. A series of Practicum are organised along with the Theory Courses. The Programme is intended to provide supervision to students for guided reading, field internship and reasearch dissertation.

7.1 Credits allotted to the Courses:

The Credits allotted to the Courses of the M.Ed. Programmes are as follows:

- i. The M.Ed. Programmes has a total of 80 credits
- ii. The Common Core Courses (Taught Course & Practicum) have 40 credits.

Perspective Courses have a total of 20 credits. They are designed so that students attain the robust theoretical perspectives on Education, in general, and Teacher Education, in particular. The Courses include:

1) Advanced Philosophy of Education - 4 credits

- 2) Advanced Education Psychology : Learning and Development 4 credits
- 3) History, Sociology and Political Economy of Education 4 credits
- 4) Advanced Educational Psychology : Individual Differences 4 credits
- 5) Curriculum Development and Transaction 4 credits
- Tools Courses have a total of 12 credits. They are envisioned to provide students skills that enable them to work as professionals and scholars in the field. The Courses include :
- 1) Introduction to Educational Research and Statistics 4 credits
- ICT and Skill Development (ICT, Communication Skill & Expository Writing, Academic Writing & Research Proposal, Self-Development including and Yoga) - 4 credits
- 3) Advanced Educational Research and Statistics 4 credits
- Teacher Education Courses have a total of 12 credits. They are intended to provide students with focussed exposure and experiences. The Courses include :
- Trends, Issues, Innovations and Research in Teacher Education = 4 credits
- Context and Issues of Elementary, Secondary and Senior Secondary Education - 4 credits
- 3) Field Internship 4 credits

c) If any student fails to pay the fee on the due date, he/she may pay the fees with a fine of Rs. 5 /- on the 10th day after due date and with an additional fine of Rs. 10/- on the 15th day. After the

extension period, the defaulter's name will be removed from the rolls. If s/he is to be re-admitted s/he has to get special permission from the Principal and also remit the fees with fine.

- d) The caution deposit of Rs. 360 /- shall be refunded when the student leaves the College at the end of the academic year after deducting dues, if any, to the College.
- It shall be the responsibility of the student to claim the refund of caution deposit paid by him/her immediately after the closing date of the College after the expiry of the academic year. The caution deposit amount will be refunded only if the receipt issued from the College is produced along with application prescribed by the Government.
- e) The University Examination fees should be paid as per University notification.
- f) Graduates of other Universities joining the B. Ed. Courses of study should produce in addition to the ceritificates (in original) of the examination passed, the Migration certificate, and remit sums of Rs.150/- towards registering the applicant as Matriculate of Mahatma Gandhi University, and Rs.150/-towards processing the application for recognition of the qualifying examination along with the application concerned.

Attendance is compulsory for all students enrolled. Leave must be applied for sanction in advance. As a rule, written application for leave should be submitted at least one day in advance in the prescribed form.

The annual certificate of attendance and progress required for admission in the University examination will not be granted unless, (1) a student has three fourths of the attendance prescribed by the college. (2) the student has completed the course of instruction to the satisfaction of the authorities of the college and (3) his/her conduct in the college and outside has been satisfactory.

Rules and Regulations

1. The Library has two sections:

i) Reference Library, and ii) Lending Library

- 2. The Library is under the supervision of the College Librarian.
- 3. The Library is open to all students and members of the Staff of the College.
- 4. The Library is kept open on all working days from 9.30 a.m. to 4.30 p.m. except on public holidays. But we provide additional 30 minutes before starting time and after closing time.
- 5. Books from the reference section will not be allowed to be taken out of the Library. They can be reffered to in the Library on all days during which the library remains open.
- 6. Silence must be observed in the library.
- 7. The students must ensure whether the book issued to them is in sound condition and if it is not so to bring the matter to the notice of the Librarian. For all damages to books noticed at the time of their return to the library the borrower will be held responsible and he will have to pay the cost of replacement.
- 8. If a book is lost by the borrower, s/he must at once report the loss to the librarian. S/he must also pay the cost of replacing it along with any fine that the Librarian/Principal may impose upon him/her.
- a. Three times the face value in the case of the books published before 1-1-1944.
- b. Two times the books value in the case of the books published after 1-1-1944
- c. If the books value cannot be ascertained, the Principal will fix the price on the basis of the market price of similar publications at the time of fixation. (Vide Circular No. P. G 6/45921/84/Coll. Edn./9-ll-84 of the Director of Collegiate Education, Government of Kerala)

- 9. If one book out of a set is lost and cannot be replaced by the cost of replacing the whole set will be recovered from the person responsible for the loss.
- 10. Periodicals, Journals, Reference Books etc. which might be difficult to replace and such other works as may from time to time be regarded as unsuitable for lending, will not be lent out.
- 11. No book shall be kept for more than 14 days, (date mentioned in the date label of the book) by a borrower. If the due date falls on a holiday the next working day will be considered as the due date. This however will not apply to due date falling within the mid-term, Christmas and Summer vacations. In such cases the books will have to be returned on the date on which the holiday commences.
- 12. The same book may be reissued to the same student at his request if there is no demand for it from any other student.
- 13. The Principal/Librarian may recall any book lent to a student at any time.
- 14. All books should be returned before the commencement of the annual examinations.
- If a book is not returned when due or called for, a fine of Rs. I/per day from defaulters will be levied (G.O.M.S. No. 66/2003, H.Edn. Government of Kerala, Non-Tax Revenue Library Fine, Dtd: 7-6-2003)
- 16. A student against whom any fine or other charge is outstanding will not be permitted to take books from the library till he has paid up in full.
- 17. Two books may be borrowed for the Onam and Christmas holidays. All such books should be returned not later than the third working day after the re-opening of the College.
- 18. All library books with the Staff should be returned at the end of every academic year (before March 31st) for physical verification and the same book may be reissued if needed. Staff members should

return books as per the Circular No.G-3/32944/04-Circulation of library books-DCE Government of Kerala and GOMS No. 66/2003) H.Edn. Govt. of Kerala..

Library Section

i. Reference Section

- 1. Readers desirous of using the reference section shall enter their names and details of the books consulted legibly in a book kept for the purpose.
- 2. Readers shall not write upon, damage or make any mark upon any book, manuscript or map belonging to the library.
- 3. Silence must be observed in the library.
- 4. Before leaving, the readers must return to the librarian any book, manuscript or map, they have taken for consultation.

ii. Periodical Section

- 1. Periodicals will not be allowed to be taken out of the library. They can be referred to in the library room during which the library remains open.
- 2. Readers should enter their names and details of the periodicals referred to in the Periodicals Issue Register. Before leaving, the readers must replace the periodicals properly in the periodical rack.

iii. Special Collection

- 1. Book Bank Collection for helping financially poor students.
- 2. Books for Remedial coaching.
- 3. Books for Career and Course guidance.
- 4. Books for preparation for entry into service,

iv. Career Corner and Career Guidance Cell

As extension service of the college, Career Guidance Cell conducts different orientation, seminars and workshops for students and school teachers.

A Career Corner is being maintained in the library. Reference sources and study materials are available for course guidance and career guidance.

v. Internet, E-mail Centre

Internet and E-mail facilities are available in the Library.

DISCIPLINE OF THE COLLEGE

As per the direction of Mahatma Gandhi University, the College functions under the guidelines of a discipline committee constituted by the College.
